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FUTURE PARTNERSHIP CONCEPTS

The partnerships listed below represent ideas discussed by the Leadership Committee during the early stages of the planning process but were not selected as near-term priorities. These concepts have not been fully analyzed and many of the details regarding who would be involved, what resources would be needed, and how the agreement would work have not been determined.

- Commercial Driver's License (CDL) Training: This partnership would tentatively be between Hanscom AFB—LRS, CE and neighboring town's Department of Public Works. In the partnership, Hanscom AFB and surrounding jurisdictions would seek to combine initial and refresher CDL training opportunities for employees. The partnership would provide potential cost savings to employees wishing to receive or required to receive as a condition of employment CDL training.
- Composting: This partnership would tentatively be between Hanscom AFB—CE and the
 Town of Lexington's Department of Public Works. Per State law, residential yard waste is
 prohibited from regular waste. In the partnership, Hanscom AFB and Lexington would
 seek to centralize existing composting operations. The partnership would provide potential
 cost savings, and is dependent of the Town of Lexington's composting capacity following
 the installation of Photovoltaic (PV) solar panels at their composting facility.
- Centralized Recycling Contract: This partnership would tentatively be between Hanscom AFB—CE and neighboring towns, and recycling contractors. In the partnership, Hanscom AFB and surrounding jurisdictions would seek to consolidate recycling contracts to provide a potential cost savings, due to economies of scale.
- Vehicle Maintenance: This partnership would tentatively be between Hanscom AFB—LRS and neighboring towns. In the partnership, Hanscom AFB—LRS would provide maintenance and major repairs on town's large/heavy vehicles. The partnership would provide potential vehicle maintenance cost savings to local jurisdictions and reimbursement to Hanscom AFB for providing the service.
- Land Use Planning-Transportation: This partnership would tentatively be between Hanscom AFB, traffic planners from neighboring towns, Massport, MBTA Shuttle Services, and "Hubway" Company representatives. In the partnership, Hanscom AFB would work with community partners to establish an on-base and limited off-based shuttle route. The partnership would expand transportation options between Hanscom AFB and surrounding towns post 9-11, reduce Personally Owned Vehicle (POV) traffic congestion on base and within local communities.
- Child Care: This partnership would tentatively be between Hanscom AFB, and local
 community partners. In the partnership, local jurisdictions would identify child care service
 providers available to the base at a discounted military or government rate. The
 partnership would expand or create much-needed child care service options for base
 employees at a potentially discounted rate.
- Food Availability: This partnership would tentatively be between Hanscom AFB, neighboring towns, and private food/catering vendors. In the partnership, Hanscom AFB would contract with local food vendors to bring "mobile" food options on base while jurisdictions would promote potential opportunity with community vendors. The

- partnership would support local businesses/economies while increasing the availability of food option on-base.
- Wellness and Resiliency: This partnership would tentatively be between health and wellness professionals from Hanscom AFB, and neighboring towns. In the partnership, Hanscom AFB and the surrounding jurisdictions would establishes a "directory" or "network" of wellness and resiliency programs or support for both on and off base entities to use as a resource to support education or training needs within their respective communities (i.e. resiliency training, wingman training, exchanges between mental health professionals, resiliency professionals etc.). The partnership would expand wellness and resiliency resources to groups and individuals, and strengthens relationships between base and town populations.
- Working Space: This partnership would tentatively be between Hanscom AFB, and neighboring towns. In the partnership, Hanscom AFB and the surrounding towns would establishes a web-based reservation system for available work spaces. The partnership would improve on the availability of working spaces to conduct meetings, training, conferences, etc., contributes to optimizing space utilization, and provide potential economic benefit to both the base and town.
- Athletic Fields: This partnership would tentatively be between Hanscom AFB, neighboring town's Parks and Recreation Departments, local athletic associations, and schools. In the partnership, Hanscom AFB would provide available land for athletic fields, communities would layout and prepare fields, the base would mow the fields, and athletic programs would keep them striped and clean. The partnership would expand the number and availability of practice filed for youth leagues, and provide additional revenue from clubs or private teams wishing to use the fields.
- Indoor Fitness: This partnership would tentatively be between Hanscom AFB, neighboring town's Parks and Recreation Departments, and the council on aging (COA). In the partnership, local Parks and Recreation Departments, and the council on aging (COA) would expand fitness and swim classes for youth and adults as well as provide gym space to local teams during low usage hours. The partnership would expand fitness programming to the Hanscom community, and provide much needed space for Parks & Recreation Departments and COA.

San Angelo Independent School District and Goodfellow AFB will jointly manage selection and training of students in grades K-8 to be sponsors for all incoming military and civilian students.

When none was found they approached AAFES. Under their partnership the base pharmacy is able to leverage underutilized space in new Base Exchange. This has led to increased prescriptions filled by 75 MDG and has also increased foot traffic in AAFES facility. AAFES is reporting a 4% increase over projected sales and the pharmacy is estimating they are saving the DoD 3.2 mil year in prescription cost by having them filled on base. The Hill satellite pharmacy is currently #3 in AF for recapture.

This partnership is between the base and 75 FSS and the privately owned Last Resort Clays. The purpose of this partnership is to increase the base Rod & Gun Club usage by hosting sponsored tournaments (only sporting clays range north of Salt Lake City. Last Resort is located in Magna UT). The MOA has been signed. The first tournament had over 100 attendees.
